

The Socio-Ecological Model




Systemic Problems require Systemic Solutions

 - ▣ Know Your Audience.





Proper Lens Focus




Equality = Sameness



JOHN DOE is among the newest members of DLIVE. A hip-hop artist, Mr. DOE has a passion for expressing himself creatively through music. He has made a name for himself on the local music scene, including having a music video that has garnered him over 1 million views and having increasingly successful shows. He sustained a GSW to his arm in MM/YYYY and is in the midst of battling the challenges that come with surviving a traumatic injury. JOHN has demonstrated incredible insight to his current mind state and has taken bold steps towards transforming his trauma. In less than 2 months, he has pursued mental fitness coaching, participated in DLIVE's Trauma Peer Support Group, began addressing his goals, and spoken at a Detroit City Council community forum. One of JOHN'S strengths is his ability to nimbly articulate his life experiences. With his father currently incarcerated, Mr. DOE matter of factly describes being "raised over a prison phone". Despite this and his own history of being incarcerated, JOHN is determined to use his past trials and tribulations as fuel and determination to reach his goals and to educate and help others. Always exuding positivity and honing his artistic craft, JOHN is a bright light to those around him and his community.


